# Better fittings made it work'

The right furniture and a few clever design tricks transformed Geoff Lunt's tiny en suite

hen Geoff Lunt bought his London flat off-plan, he had some input on the design of the en suite but it was never quite to his taste. After five years he decided to change it, along with the other rooms in his home, and he asked designer Nicola Holden to come up with a new look and manage the work.

'These are what I call "yuppie flats" and they're completely featureless,' says Geoff. 'I really wanted to stamp my character on the room and change it dramatically. Nicola actually had to rein me back.'

The bad use of space was the main problem. 'The large cupboard under the basin dominated the room, and the space either side of the loo was wasted when it could have been used for storage,' says Geoff. The bathroom is so small that it wasn't possible to reposition the suite, so instead Nicola sourced compact fittings and removed a stud wall in the shower area to allow for the bigger shower Geoff wanted. He is thrilled with the results. 'It proves small spaces can be functional and stylish, without blowing the budget,' he says.

## How I did it

66 I paid Nicola £1,000 to do everything from coming up with the design to sourcing products and

overseeing the work. The room is so small that there were no more than two men working on it at a time. They stripped out the en suite, removed a stud wall, fitted the suite and lighting, and painted and tiled. The work cost £1,550 and took three weeks.
